THE REGENCY HR-2, CLEGG FM-27 AND OTHER EARLY TWO METER RIGS

Regency was a pioneer in solid state equipment, both for consumer electronics and ham radio items. They built the world's first commercial transistor radio, the model TR-1, in 1954, only six years after the transistor's invention at Bell Telephone Laboratories. In 1956, they announced the first item of solid state ham radio equipment, the AR-1 mobile converter. At the time, essentially all phone ham radio operation was on AM, so a normal automobile radio with a ham band converter was a suitable ham radio receiver for AM phone reception.

Their next item of ham gear was the wildly popular model HR-2 two meter FM transmitter-receiver designed primarily for mobile operation. The unit was crystal controlled only on both transmit and receive, all solid state, and quite small. When it came out, most hams on two meter FM were using lightly modified commercial two-way high band equipment from Motorola, GE, RCA, Link, and others.

The first rig made for ham radio two meter FM was the Clegg 22er FM, a version of the AM radio, the original Clegg 22er home and mobile rig. It had a tunable receiver and a crystal controlled transmitter running about 20 watts input to a single 2E26 final amplifier tube. The HR-2 used a crystal controlled receiver, much more suitable for channelized repeater operation. It was much smaller, but had almost the same power level as the Clegg rig. It was a very popular radio; we sold them at Pioneer-Standard Electronics at East 55th Street and Prospect Avenue in Cleveland; I sold dozens of them. They were much easier to use mobile than the Clegg 22er FM or old converted commercial two-way radio gear. A car equipped with a simple ¹/₄ wave whip antenna 19 inches long, or a gain antenna like the Newtronics BBLT-144 5/8 wave vertical and the Regency HR-2 was able to operate well with all local repeaters and the HR-2 was quite easy on the automobile's 12-volt electrical system, drawing 800 mA on receive at high volume and about 3 amps on transmit in the high power position. The HR-2 and the related models like the HR-2B and the base station HR-212 were all crystal controlled, requiring a pair of custom-made crystals for each channel desired.

The Clegg FM-27 that quickly advanced to the very popular model FM-27B was the next major step in two meter FM radios. There were many "me, too" radios that followed the Regency HR-2 that were crystal controlled and needed a pair of crystals for each channel or repeater desired. The groundbreaking Clegg FM-27B had a ten position switch and a 300+ degree potentiometer. The switch selected the 100 KHz steps; there is a separate control for the receiver and the transmitter. Each has a continuous control that moves the frequency within the 100 KHz step to allow the operator to set the exact desired frequency, like 146.52 MHz. *Please see REGENCY HR-2 on page 7*

The Clegg FM-27B needed no crystals to reach any frequency between 146.00 and 148.00 MHz; a toggle switch set 146-147 MHz or 147-148 MHz, the ten position switches for transmit and receive [2 switches] and a continuous control for each to move within each 100 KHz step to tune to the each 10 KHz point needed. I added an external touch-tone pad to my Clegg FM-27B so I could make telephone calls via a repeater with an autopatch available like the 146.16/146.76 repeater had at the time. In 1974, a mobile telephone was a rare luxury. At the time, there were endless discussions about whether you could order a pizza using an autopatch call with a two-meter radio; it was definitely a profit-making endeavor for the pizza shop, but not for the ham radio operator.

The FM-27B did not have a built-in sub-audible tone encoder, which limits its utility today, but I have designed a subaudible tone generator that is built into the microphone of my Clegg FM-27B to make it usable with many repeaters today. I have set it up to work with the QCWA Chapter One repeater and the Pittsburgh North Hills Amateur Radio repeater. The details of the subaudible tone generator design I did will appear in a future issue of <u>Electric Radio</u> <u>Magazine</u>.
