SOME MORE GOOD STUFF FROM JIM

I live near the lake, so in the summer I monitor several of the US Coast Guard frequencies via my VHF ham radio. You can hear them talking to boats, giving out weather reports, boats talking to other boats, etc. The busiest channels are 16 (156.800MHz) and 22A (157.100MHz).

Sometimes you will hear them refer to 22B and 83B. Those are weather channels that are not in use in NE Ohio. Instead, you can monitor NOAA weather on 162.550 MHz on the east side, 162.500 MHz on the west side and 162.400 MHz south, near Akron. They all have good coverage. Listen to all three and pick the best signal in your area. If you are not in the immediate area, go to the NOAA website for frequencies used in counties near you.

If you have any other USCG channels that you monitor, let me know.

Jeannie, KC8MNW and I followed DARA's advice and parked at a remote lot and transferred to a yellow school bus that shuttled us to the site. Unfortunately, the normally 15 minute ride took 1 hour and 45 minutes. Fortunately, we were in no hurry and even got transferred to a farm wagon pulled by a tractor across a field that took us near the entrance gate.

I really like the fairgrounds. Everything was clean and relatively new, there were many food wagons, each serving a different style food, the exhibit halls were close together and the forum buildings were very large and air conditioned!

For the first time in about 35 years of continual attendance I did not visit the flea market only because I failed to bring my mud boots. USE OF THE "Q" SIGNAL ON RAILROADS

As a ham radio operator, and steam rail enthusiast, I am often asked about the "Q" signal and how it originated. You know the one, where a locomotive passing a crossing blows two long whistle blasts, then a short blast, followed by another long blast: dah dah dit dah, or Q. I recently read an explanation in a railroad magazine about it, pertaining to the Queen of England being on board, and that the Q was for "Queen."

Supposedly this convention started with steamboats and carried over to railroads. But in my research on this subject many years ago, this explanation, while quite clever, is probably not true for several reasons.

- 1. The original telegraph code was invented and implemented by Morse in 1844. I am sure the Queen traveled by boat prior to this date, since the steamboat was invented in 1783. The steam locomotive was invented in 1825 and the first use of a steam whistle on a locomotive was 1833. I also recently read that the Queen first traveled by train in 1842, all prior to the invention of the Morse code.
- 2. The telegraphers code was called American Morse, and the code for the letter Q was not dah dah dit dah, but actually the opposite: dit dit dah dit. American Morse is what was used by the US railroad telegraphers and was often referred to as "Railroad code."

Many other letters in American Morse are different from what evolved into the current International Morse Code which was used on the radio many years later. I used to work with a fellow ham, the late John Cunningham, ex-W8JJL, who worked as a telegrapher for the Boston and Maine. He knew and used both codes over the years.

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. He is the one who got my curiosity going about the "Q" code many years ago.

- 3. I read somewhere that the original railroad whistle code for a crossing was: dah dah dit. However, some engineman thought it would be better to hold the last note through the crossing and it became the common: dah dah dit dah as we here in the US know it.
- 4. There is an excellent article on Wikipedia about the American Morse Code, with additional interesting details about others who were involved. I wish I had it when I started on my quest for info back in the late 1970s. Back then it was go to the library and read books, lots of books, to do the research.
- 5. So the correct answer to the "Q" question appears to be, "The similarity between International Morse code Q and the whistle signal for a crossing is simply coincidence!"

I have found nothing to suggest Otherwise.
