

## THE GONSET G-76 -A Review by George Misic, KE8RN

The Gonset G-76 is a unique piece of equipment; it is an AM-CW [not SSB] transceiver covering 80 to 6 meters. It came out in 1960, three years after Collins introduced the first true SSB-CW transceiver, the historic KWM-1. The Gonset G-76 is



not a true transceiver, in that it does not transmit and receive on the same frequency unless the operator puts the internal VFO on the same frequency manually. The internal VFO does not work on six meters; six operation is only crystal controlled transmission. Except for six meter coverage, the G-76 is essentially a G66 receiver and G-77 transmitter in a single box. The concept of putting a

receiver and transmitter for 80 to 10 meters in a single box small enough to use mobile was a fairly new idea.

The Gonset G-76 uses a 6DQ5 color TV horizontal sweep tube as the final amplifier. It is a tribute to the versatility of vacuum tubes, or hollow state technology as they are sometimes known that the 6DQ5 was made by RCA to operate at 15.75 KHz in their first color television sets starting in 1953. It works quite well in the G-76 [and the Hallicrafters HT-40 AM-CW transmitter] at up to 54 MHz. The rig runs 100 watts on CW and 80 watts on AM for a good bit more power than rigs using a single 6146 true RF transmitting tube. Swan used the 6DQ5 in their single band transceivers for 75, 40, and 20 meters and their tri-band model 240 covering 75, 40, and 20 meters and rated them at 180 or 240 watts PEP.

The Gonset G-76 does not have any built-in power supplies; they offered an AC power supply and speaker combination in a cabinet the same size as the G-76. They also offered a separate solid state 12 VDC power supply for mobile; it was in a utility enclosure for mounting in a concealed location and was solid state, using transistors to make AC to produce the required high voltage. No vibrator is used as was used in the DC power supplies for the earlier Gonset G-66 and G-66B mobile receiver and G-77 mobile transmitter.

The G-76 has high-level plate modulation on AM using a pair of 6DQ6 black and white TV horizontal sweep tubes. These are located inside the transceiver, not in the separate power supply, like was done with the six meter Clegg Thor. The earlier Gonset G-77 AM-CW mobile transmitter used the somewhat smaller, lighter duty 6BQ6 tubes introduced for use in black and white television as horizontal sweep tubes.

The Gonset G-76 has a quite nice receiver, but it is designed for AM and not SSB or CW; it works fairly well on SSB and CW but does not have a product detector or AGC on SSB or CW. If it had been brought out earlier, I think the G-76 would have been even more popular. SSB was starting to catch on when it was first marketed; I am sure the lack of SSB capability was a limiting factor. (continued on page 7)

- no other AM low band transceivers other than a few efforts that went nowhere from Hallicrafters that were just a
- receiver and transmitter in a single
- enclosure. Multi-Elmac, Morrow, Heathkit, and earlier, Gonset made
- separate transmitters and receivers aimed at mobile and to some extent, home stations, but no one else offered an AM transceiver for 80-10 meters.
