Second place was awarded to the Massillon Amateur Radio Club (78 points); with our third place score 76 points.

Judging was done by non-hams. They evaluate style (15%), content (35%), service to members (35%) and clarity of presentation (15%). \blacksquare

News From Ham Radio's

Wide World

Hams in space marks 25 years. On Dec. 8, 1983, Owen Garriott, W5LFL, became the first Amateur Radio operator to talk to hams from space while on board the shuttle Columbia. Special activities to mark the anniversary were scheduled, including contact with schools and 9600 baud packet transmissions.

Kitty QRM: A string of mysterious "dits" heard on 7.0574 MHz was tracked to a ham's QTH in Westerville, Ohio, by OO Rick Swain, KK8O. The cause? A house cat had apparently bumped a keyer and turned on the transmitter while the owner was at work. **ARRL vs. FCC:** An experimental license granted by the FCC to Digital Aurora Radio Technologies that included 7.1 to 7.3 MHz is being challenged by ARRL. The company was authorized 20kHz digital emissions at 100 KW. The League pointed out that Amateur Radio is allocated exclusive use of these frequencies.

KP5 DXpedition OK: The U.S. Fish & Wildlife Service has approved an early 2009 DXpedition to rare Desecheo Island. The small, uninhabited island is located 14 miles off the west coast of Puerto Rico.
