

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New west side input providing Better repeater coverage *Check it out during our Wednesday net*

400 feet up a tower on the Southwest Side of Royalton is the new Chapter One 146.850 repeater input antenna. It's filling in some of the West Side coverage "holes" that the East Side receiver doesn't hear.

According to Radio Officer Jim Pracker, K8QOT, the new input has been tested over the past six months, "but still has some technical glitches." Further work on the voter is underway.

In the meantime, Pracker strongly urges users to run more power than simple HTs to assure a good signal into the machine. "Users of five-watt HTs are marginal unless they're quite near to the input," he says.

For those running adequate power — say 100 watts — with a good antenna, they should be able to access the repeater from throughout a wide area. Pracker reports being able to reach it from Canton, Youngstown and Fremont.

More improvements are coming, so stay tuned! ■



Radio Classics

The Heathkit HW-101

You bought it, built it, loved it!



In the 1970s Heathkit introduced the HW-101. It evolved out of previous models: the SB-100, SB-102 and HW-100. In production for 13 years, it sold in kit form for \$399.95 and about 40,000 were sold.

The HW-101 transceiver covered 80-10 meters SSB & CW and ran 100 watts or 180 watts PEP. An improvement over the HW-100, it included a CW filter as an option and used a better VFO and main tuning drive design. It also had better receiver sensitivity than the HW-100.

The "hot water 101" featured a pair of popular 6146 tubes and was powered by an outboard power supply. Other common tubes used included the 6AU6, 12AT7, 12AU7, 6CL6, 6HS6 and OA2. Owners learned to heed Heathkit's warning not to substitute 6146B or 6146W types, since they were impossible to neutralize.

The HW-101 takes its place in ham radio history as one of the most beloved, respected and successful transceivers ever sold. ■

Member profile

K8OCK: Sweden to Cleveland

John Esborn was born in Halmstad, Sweden in 1920 and moved here with his family at age 10. He spoke no English but learned quickly. After attending East Technical and Fenn College he began a life-long career in mechanical engineering.



In 1942 John entered the Army Air Corps, trained as a flight engineer, (his first flight was with Charles Lindburgh) and flew 18 missions including 7 as co-pilot. His B24 was shot down over Vienna in 1944 and John bailed out with a ripped parachute, landing hard and breaking both ankles.

Surgery was successful. But John soon faced a German firing squad, escaping death when his captors elected to interrogate him. His POW camp was abandoned by his captors as the war ended, and John recovered his health as he returned to U.S civilian life.

Engineering was his first love, and his career covered positions with material handling firms. He co-founded Hoist Equipment Co., worked for Lubrizol, was chief engineer at David Round Co., and retired in 1982 as Director of Engineering for Stanspec Corp.

His ham interest began in 1935, but not until 1958 did he receive a license. As K8OCK, he designed and built much of his own equipment — including receivers, transmitters, antennas and microphones. His handiwork led to his second contact with far off Hawaii. His station has included several HF rigs, including Ten Tec Omnis and Jupiters, but now is confined to VHF operation.

John's family includes two daughters, one son, six grandchildren and four great grandchildren. His wife Rosie passed away in 1986.

Over the years, K8OCK has traveled to most of the European countries, Africa and above the Arctic Circle.

John's other interests include reading, photography, and golf, which he once played in bare feet on a doctor's orders. ■



News From Ham Radio's Wide World

Sunny news: NASA's space watchers have reported a new sunspot cluster associated with the next cycle. This, plus the solar flux number above 71 is good news for radio hams.

More hams in space: The recent 16-day mission to the International Space Station included additional amateur radio licensed astronauts, bringing to six the total number on board.

Antenna firm closes: Texas Bug Catcher Antennas will go out of business and stop taking orders for new antennas after October 31, 2009. No reason was given for the closure.

FCC nabs importer: A citation for marketing unauthorized RF devices was issued to The Spy Store, a Washington State company. The items were "GPS Jammers" that jam signals emitted by a GPS transmitter, disabling a receiver from finding the location.

MFJ buys Cushcraft: The amateur radio antenna line of Cushcraft Amateur Radio, owned by Laird Technologies has been purchased by MFJ. The line of vertical, beam and Yagi antennas will continue to be manufactured in Manchester, New Hampshire. MFJ now offers antennas by Hy-Gain, MFJ and Cushcraft in addition to products by Ameritron, Mirage, and Vectronics. ■
